

SCIENCE DEPT NEWS

Every year our students are offered amazing opportunities to experience learning in real Scientific environments.

This year Annalisa McConachie, Gemma Marnane and Lachlan Thomson attended the University of Otago Science Academy. This is a stellar programme consisting of two residential programmes as well as mentoring over the year.

Millie-Mae Wallace was accepted into the Science and Technology Forum in Auckland and Gabriella Alexander attended the Science Summer School at the University of Canterbury. The following are quick summaries of their experiences.

Annalisa McConachie

On the programme we had two projects - one an elective and the other a science communications project. Mine consisted of chemistry, genetics and biochemistry, toxicology and Science film making. I had a different lecture every day that helped us all to get a taste for a variety of sciences.

When we weren't working on projects we had time to explore Dunedin and take advantage of the University facilities. Living at Otago for that week really helped me get a taste of student life, as well as help me decide which degree I want to pursue.

Attending the academy was unexplainably, beyond words incredible for me! Seeing the dynamics of the University of Otago along with meeting so many insanely intelligent lecturers and postgraduate students, as well as all the school students, allowed me to form great friendships with others from all around the country!

SCIENCE & ART NEWS

"Hands On" at Otago University

This programme is offered every January. It is for Year 12 students and offers 36 different projects across all learning areas of the university. Students experience living in the Halls of Residence and are immersed into the university culture of learning. The following are the experiences of three of our students who went this year.

Amy Miller

"I was in the history project and it was an amazing experience I will take with me in my future endeavours. To learn not just about the history of Dunedin and New Zealand but to experience the week in the life of a real university student has made up my mind that University is definitely the right path for me. I didn't want to leave once the week was up and I have made some friends for life. It is an experience I would highly recommend to anyone and everyone."

During the five days of Hands-On at Otago, I learnt about sociology, gender and social work. On the first day, we looked at sociology and how the merit system is seen throughout our lives. The way we were introduced to the concept was through a scavenger hunt, both teams were given money for the tasks but my team was given \$70 while the other team was only given \$50 which shows how people are born with different advantages and disadvantages.

The second day consisted of a discussion on different genders and how people view them. Afterwards we went to the mall and looked at how advertisers use different tactics to appeal to different consumers e.g. men and women. The third day we looked at criminology and how prison sentences are decided. We went to the old Dunedin prison and did the escape rooms.

On the fourth and final day of the programme, we looked into how food banks work in New Zealand and read about a family of four who struggle with money. We also went to the Presbyterian food bank in Dunedin. Overall the sociology, gender and social work was an awesome project to be in.

At Hands-On Otago, I was accepted into the 'Philosophy Project' which is definitely an experience to remember. I was taught to overthink thinking and honestly, my mind will not look at the simple things the same. I definitely recommend this experience to anyone even if you aren't sure on heading to University. The people, the atmosphere and the learning was definitely worth it.

ART TRIP TO RIVERTON
