Amie went on to the New Zealand Nationals during the holidays where she gained two final entries and came 4th in the 200m Backstroke, breaking the Southland record twice by 5 seconds.

We are very proud of Amie Pratt, Year 9 who has enjoyed some phenomenal success recently for swimming.

Amie is the CSC Junior Champion after breaking an amazing five school records last term. She equalled the record for the 25m Freestyle, 25m Backstroke, 25m Breaststroke, 25m Butterfly and the 3 x 25 Medley.

Since then, Amie has competed in the Southland Swimming Champs—gaining a 2nd place and two 3rd places.



Amie has just returned from Fiji where Amie competed at the Fijian National Championships. There were 18 teams competing including from Australia, NZ, Tonga and Fiji and a total of 400 swimmers. Amie won four Individual Gold medals, three Individual Silver medals and three Team Golds in the relays.



LIBRARY NEWS

Road Safety Week. May 7 to 14

As a large proportion of our students travel by bus, there is a timely reminder for all those on the buses and on the road.

The school bus is one of the safest ways to travel. Tips suggested by NZMTA. Waiting for the bus

- Wait at the nominated bus stop area.
- Keep well away from the road edge.
- Wait quietly, avoid playing games where you might end up running onto the road.

Getting on the bus

- Form a single line.
- Make sure the bus has stopped before you try to get on.
- Don't push. Be patient and let those in front of you get on without any shoving or pushing.
- Carry your backpack or school bag it may get caught in the door if you wear it.
- Let younger children on first.

Riding on the bus

- Quickly choose your seat and sit down.
- Put your bag on your lap or under your seat keep the bus aisle clear.
- Stay in your seat until the bus has stopped.
- Follow what the bus driver or bus warden tells you to do.
- If you have to stand, put your bag on the floor and hold onto a seat back or handrail.

Getting off the bus

- Get off the bus carefully, without pushing.
- After you get off the bus, wait as far away from the edge of the road as you can, until the bus has moved away.
- If you need to cross the road, wait until the bus has driven past and you can see clearly up and down the road before crossing. Always use the <u>kerb drill</u> to cross.
- Stand well clear of the bus if it is turning or reversing.

For those driving (NZ Road Code)

The signs below will be displayed on school buses. If a school bus has stopped you must slow down and drive at **20km/h** or less until you are well past **(no matter which direction you are coming from)** if:

- the bus displays a school bus sign on which the lights a flashing, or
- the bus displays a school bus sign (with or without flashing lights) and has stopped for the purpose of picking up or dropping off school children.



Note: you may also see 'Kura', the Māori word for school, on a bus.

ENROLMENT SCHEME FOR CENTRAL SOUTHLAND COLLEGE

The Ministry of Education has requested that the Board of Trustees implement an enrolment scheme in accordance with section 11H of the Education Act 1989, to avoid overcrowding at the school.

As part of this process, we need to consult with our school community, the wider community and neighbouring schools. The Ministry is preparing a proposed zone as a basis for consultation, the Board have been involved in supplying the ministry with relevant information and current data and will continue this as part of the consultation process. When the map is available from the Ministry, it will be made available to all concerned.

The introduction of an enrolment scheme will not affect children who are currently enrolled at Central Southland College, they will continue to be enrolled at the school. ("Currently enrolled" means that the child is enrolled at and has started attending Central Southland College when the scheme becomes effective.)

For children who have not yet enrolled at Central Southland College, when the scheme comes into effect, the enrolment scheme means that:

If they live in the zone, they will have the right to enrol at Central Southland College.

The Board of Trustees enforces the enrolment scheme **and if students live outside the zone**, they will only be able to enrol at Central Southland College if there are places available in their year group. If more children wish to enrol than there are places available, the Education Act says that places must be offered to children in the following order of priority:

Students accepted for enrolment in a special programme run by the school and approved by the Secretary of Education (this does not apply to Central Southland College).

- Siblings of current students.
- Siblings of former students.
- Children of former students
- Children of staff and board members.
- All other students

If more children within any one of these priority groups wish to enrol than there are places available, the Board must conduct a ballot to determine who is offered a place.

We have scheduled an information meeting for Wednesday the 16th May at 7:00pm in the school hall. This meeting is for anyone from our community, both those with children currently attending and those with prospective students. We are hopeful the Ministry will have provided more information at that stage and we can explain in greater detail the process and attempt to answer any questions. We will also explain how you may go about making submissions as part of the consultation process.

We appreciate that this process will cause uncertainty for some families, and we will keep you informed as the process develops through the school newsletter and on our website. If you have any questions at this stage please contact the Principal, Grant Dick or Mr Peter Turnbull.
