## *From the Principal*

Nga mihi nui ki a koutou katoa—warm greetings to you all.

Information has been delivered to all families about the proposed bus changes for 2020. While we have been aware that there were changes to Dipton and Otautau routes, we were not aware that all bus routes would be altered for 2020. The Ministry of Education has stated that all buses will operate within our School Transport Zone and while we have been aware that this has been the forecast, we had not had any further information regarding the routes until it was delivered on 3rd July 2019.



The transport zones are established in order to give boundaries for buses to operate in an economic way for school transport. While we, as a school and school Board understand the logic around that, we believe there should be an adequate consultation process around the rolling out of such a change. We are continuing to request from the Ministry that consideration be given to this process and that there should be extra time granted. Also, that this proposed change of replacing our 13 routes for 8 routes, requires time and consultation and that consideration must be given to the location (rural Southland), the weather conditions, road conditions and general health and safety around the routes that are proposed.

## Marine Science Extension Program

Over Term 2, we (Cara Barnes and Kate Hindle) went to Dunedin three times to the Portabello Marine Biology Centre. We had 5 nights on Quarantine Island and both participated in two different studies—mudflats and microplastics. Cara's group's main research was on mudflats and how different types of roads affected biodiversity and abundance of the species. We went to four different sites and collected different samples of the areas to try and answer our question.

Kate's group studied the effects of plastic pollution and microplastics in the marine environment, investigating how it affects both marine life and humans in their way of living. We found that microplastics are ingested by animals and humans.

We had such an amazing experience and we would like to thank everyone that made this possible.

Year 13 students are now applying for Scholarships and for Residential Colleges, and have realised now that their grades from Year 12 are the ones that matter, if they are to be selected. Year 12 are reminded that Universities are now making entry criteria more difficult, and that they should be aiming to achieve to their potential THIS YEAR. A Merit or Excellence Endorsement on their Level 2 NCEA will open doors for them.

## **Residential Colleges**

Students who are continuing with Tertiary Education in 2020 are applying for accommodation on line in August. Students will hear in the first week of October whether or not the Halls have accepted them for next year and they will be asked to forward a deposit as acceptance of the offer.

## **Study Link**

Studylink no longer give a Parent Information session. Students and caregivers are encouraged to apply on-line as early as possible. Chris Ridden at Studylink Invercargill is available for appointments if you need to meet with her.

## **Visitors to CSC**

Otago University, University of Canterbury and Auckland University Liaisons will meet individually with Year 13's this term to help them with their course planning for 2020. If students require more guidance they can make an appointment with Careers staff. We also have the Liaison from Otago Polytechnic here on the 13th August.

## **SIT Applications**

If applying for SIT courses for 2020 the student needs to complete their CV and an application form online. Careers staff are happy to help with both. Applications should be away by the end of this term at the latest. SIT are here on the 19th of August to help students and answer any questions they may have.

## **Career Fest**

All Year 11 and Year 12 students attended CareerFest in Invercargill on 1st August. Students had identified which Exhibitors they wanted to meet and had prepared questions to help them make the most of their limited time. This exposure to so many Providers helps the students to see how many pathways are open to them, and what they need to achieve while at school to make their chosen pathway a reality.

Towards the end of Term 3 we will run Subject Selection Workshops with our Year 9 and 10's. These workshops should help students make good choices. They could also check the CareersNZ website for help with subject choice.
