
From the Principal



for 2018. Our aim as student leaders is to get student voice about how we can make school a positive experience for everyone.






Internet Use and Screen Time

A Principal from a neighbouring school has expressed his concerns in a Stuff article over the weekend about students spending too much time gaming and not enough time sleeping. His concerns have been backed up by an internet safety expert who suggests parents should keep devices out of their children's bedrooms at night. A recent survey with 35 of our own students showed some alarming information. Data collected from some students recently revealed some surprising internet use and screen-time results. The group was asked to list the three websites (could include social media) they spend the most time on and give an estimate of the amount of time they spend on each site during a week. We think parents might be interested in how this sample of students have responded around the amount of time they are spending on certain websites/apps.

Year 9 Taster News

Activities—Cake Decorating

The Dangers of Concussion

Over the past few weeks, Year 9's have been learning about the dangers of concussion. This is a type of injury that you may suffer from when you get a blow (hit) to your head. It can be dangerous and life threatening sometimes.

Some die from concussion as the damage is very harmful and can cause brain haemorrhages (brain bleeds). We need to understand that others around us may have concussion unknown to others. Secondary blows to the head can extend the time period of recovery and can even paralyse. We interviewed some students, Lachie Dobson, Sam Egan and Tyla Green, who have experience with concussion. They all advised that we should be careful around sufferers as another knock can put them in further danger. Having a concussion takes a while to recover from but provided the person is careful, they will be fine. All you need to do is rest and relax.

Having a concussion affects your ability to focus and you may find yourself struggling to work on a task for as long as you used to. Lachie, Sam and Tyla have come together in hopes of educating us with their message 'Be sensible and keep others safe'.

Year 13 students have been given lots of information over the past few weeks, to help them make decisions for 2019. We have had various presentations from tertiary providers, information evenings in Invercargill, as well as trips away to look at study options. The next step for the students is to visit the websites of all of the tertiary providers that interest them and read the detailed information about the various courses. A number of students are also currently applying for the mid-year intake for SIT courses. We are here to help with their CV preparation and are happy to assist with the application process.

Scholarships

There are over 3,000 scholarships available to students heading to tertiary next year. If Year 13 students want to see a full list of available scholarships, they can access the "givMe" website via any public library. This website can also be accessed from the Southland District Council website under "Library data". Alternatively, the students can check out the "moneyhub" website which also lists thousands of scholarships available. It could be worth spending a few hours researching exactly what is available in the way of scholarships.

A Note or Two from the Bus Controller

From a safety point of view, the entrance to Central Southland College is far from ideal. As it is a recognised danger spot (a right angled corner, narrow road, entrance shared by cars and walkers, multiple buses and cars doing drop offs and pick-ups) the Council has put in place some features that are intended to keep our students as safe as possible.

We are very concerned about the number of vehicles that are ignoring these features and putting our students in more danger than necessary. These features are the yellow lines (indicating no stopping/parking) along with the signs shown above (also indicating no stopping at any time).

As those who are involved in drop-offs and pick-ups will know, this area is extremely busy immediately before the start of the school day and again immediately after school. It is at these times that it is essential that the safety features put in place are strictly adhered to.

I would also like to remind everyone that when passing a stationary school bus, the law requires that you do not exceed 20km/h. In the afternoon, there are buses parked on Mackenzie Street until 3:15pm. Two of the buses park on Mackenzie Street just past the intersection with Home Street. It would be appreciated if room is left along this section for these buses to park. In the interests of student safety, we ask everyone in this area at these times to drive at a sensible speed.
