We also welcome a new Dean into the fold. Congratulations to Mrs Alyssa Johnstone who has taken over the reins from Miss Sam Dickie as the new Year 11 Dean. We farewelled Miss Dickie at the end of last week.

Our Science department recently featured in a document produced by the Education Review Office. It highlighted the outstanding work of our teachers and students. The document is a national tool, sent to all schools in New Zealand to provide evidence and guidance around student engagement. We are so fortunate to have this level of educational excellence at CSC.

We recently sent surveys out to all parents and caregivers to gather feedback regarding our schools cultural responsiveness. Thank you to those who have completed this, we have also gathered feedback from students, staff and have this week completed full observations across the school to witness the wonderful array of teaching and learning in our classrooms. This information will be collected and used as a discussion point, as we continually seek to improve our practice and our environment, for our students.

Changes to the NCEA qualification system are in the planning stages with a view to full implementation in 2023. Our current Year 9 students will be the first students to experience the changes. Many aspects are still being developed and schools across the country are working on what this will look like for them. We will share important information with the community as things are finalised.

The upgrade to B Block is almost complete, with just a few minor finishing touches to be made. This Block is now fully functional and the improvements have made a huge difference to the warmth, condition and appearance of the building. The Gymnasium is currently closed, the majority of the demolition work has been completed and we now await the construction of the alteration and upgrade work. PE classes are relocated around the school and the hall has become a makeshift gym. Students have adapted well and huge thanks to the PE teachers for relocating classes around the school.

The Admin upgrade is only a short way off completion, we thank everyone for their tolerance of this situation while the work is continuing and especially to our office staff who have navigated their working life around building noise and disruption.

Recently, the Student Council held a mufti day to raise funds for the Rescue Helicopter service in Southland. Our Deputy Principal, Brendon Wallace participated in the "Chopper Ride" for this worthy cause in which he cycled from Queenstown to Invercargill with a large group of other cyclists. The total of CSC fundraising was around \$3,000 from students and staff. This is an outstanding effort for this wonderful service to our community. Thank you to everyone who contributed.

Last Friday our students took to the stage at the Civic, for the annual Show Quest performing arts competition. Hours of work went into this production by both students and staff and we witnessed an amazing performance that we can all be proud of. Fantastic dance, choreography, colourful costumes, digital backdrop and a theme that gave a simple but clear message... Be Kind! Thanks to Kelly Wilkinson, Sarah Faithfull, Chris Knapp and many others who helped out behind the scenes.

Finally I would like to give a 'plug' for the swimming pool fundraiser. the Community Pool Committee give of their time and resources to ensure our community continues to have a functioning pool. They are currently fundraising as there is a need to purchase a new heating system and a new roof will be constructed shortly. Forms should be coming home where you can purchase some household items as a fundraiser, thank you in advance for your support.
