The Future of Learning at CSC

As a school we are currently looking at how we deliver the NZ Curriculum. A core group of four staff, within a wider curriculum change group of about 20 staff are investigating ways of delivering our curriculum that differ from traditional schooling with the aim of better catering to the needs and interests of all of our tamariki.

As yet, we are only in the early stages and have no set plans on what this might look like. This term, as a staff, we are looking into CSC's history, strengths and reasons for change and then looking forward to possible options that we could initiate in the coming years. We are actively engaging with other schools around the country to see what they are doing and how different curriculum methods are working for them. We are also interested to hear the perspectives of our pupils, both present and past, and members of our community.

Ideally we hope to retain the aspects of curriculum delivery that we are doing well and initiate change to enhance the educational experience of each of our students.

Raising Student Achievement—Jenny Tebbutt

I have had many parents reach out with concerns for their children, particularly those with learning difficulties. The unsettled two years and maybe more yet to come in education has not been good for anybody but least of all our underachieving students. This problem has also been highlighted in the media.

Our free parent webinars were very well attended in 2021 and we are going to run these again this year. We have a new parent hub on our website which has all the dates for the year and the link for parents to register.

There are many parents out there wanting more. Some have been finding it difficult to work with children over lockdown, some have realised that their children need more help than can be given at school and some have realised that traditional extra tuition isn't the best support for their child (because they are third wave students) and it is often expensive. We have started working with parents/caregivers over a 6-month time frame offering:

- 1. A screening assessment for learning difficulties and literacy. A report with recommendations for next steps for further assessment if needed.
- 2. Designing, implementing, and supporting a home learning plan based on parent/student needs and time. The plan includes:
 - Reading/ decodable texts or levelled as appropriate
 - Spelling/Alpha to Omega phonemic/phonological
 - Oral Language HPP if appropriate
 - It can also include writing and numeracy.
- 3. Online training for parents/caregivers for chosen programmes
- 4. Literacy resources and copy of The Wobbly Kids Handbook for schools and teachers is also included.
- 5. Post testing after two terms to measure progress and consider next steps
